elcome to the summer edition of the *Crusader Chronicle*, where we celebrate our graduates, and reflect on another impactful year of Christian

education at WCS. As you know, our school has been focused on Teaching for Transformation (TfT) for the past three years. TfT has introduced us to a set of throughlines which they define as, "discipleship habits and practices that both form the learners and transform God's world around them. Throughlines help students, teachers, and parents imagine what it means to be a disciple within God's story. They articulate a vision for how their school's graduates will live." 
Throughlines are much more than just educational goals; they are the enduring understandings and practices that we aim to instill in our students, guiding them as they grow into the individuals God has called them to be. These throughlines are threads that weave together the fabric of our character.

Having spent many hours at Old Sturbridge Village when my children were young, I have seen the process of creating yarn or thread from wool. As is obvious, shearing a sheep doesn't just result in a skein of yard. There is the washing, the combing (to remove more impurities and strengthen the fiber), followed by spinning the fibers into thread. Just as there is a process to go from wool to fabric, there is a process we must follow in order for the TfT Throughlines to be an integral part of each graduate's life. From preschool through grade 12, we are working through the stages of recognizing, modeling, and practicing the particular traits that God desires in each of us. At WCS we are partnering with parents to develop these threads, threads that when woven together create a strong foundation for a life focused on "Christ-like service in God's world."

In May, 54 students graduated from WCS, prepared to take the step from recognizing and practicing these throughlines to living out the final part of our mission: "Christ-like service in God's world." We look forward to seeing them carry forward the threads of what they have learned here, weaving the rich fabric of a life dedicated to faith and service.



Our Graduates are Living the Story!





We were thrilled to welcome special guest, Andy Macdonald (Class of 1993) in the roles of Johnny Casino and Teen Angel. Andy Macdonald




has been making theater ever since a friend convinced him to audition for *Cheaper By the Dozen* (directed by Jerry Van Tol) as a sophomore at WCS. He is

lessons highlight people from the past and present whose lives reflect these traits. In May our 5th grade students held a history museum where they were able to articulate the throughlines their historical person had developed, with examples for the audience. During a 7th grade History class studying city planning Mr. DeWeerd highlighted a city planner's trait of beauty seeking. As our teachers focus on these throughlines, it becomes a natural part of conversing with students. Students also begin to recognize these traits in their peers as they participate in chapels led by students, receive tutoring assistance after school from fellow students, and engage in the hallways with students who are community builders.

From recognition, comes modeling. Our goal is to hire faculty and staff who can model these throughlines with students by living them out in their own lives and practice. Mrs. Kuder's ability to create beauty through art serves as a visible model to her students. In fact, the proliferation of visible artwork on our campus serves as a model to all of us of the importance of many of the throughlines.

Having students practice these qualities is the next step in developing our students into people with a strong character that can make a difference in the world beyond WCS. Continual practice strengthens the fibers of these throughlines. The examples are endless, as our entire mission hinges on "nurturing the academic, spiritual, personal, social, creative, and physical development of students" for the purpose of service.










Order Discovering






Servant Working
